I'm Margarida, a Portuguese solo traveler who decided to leave everything behind to travel in my self-converted van with my dog Koa.



Baking is a passion of mine, with a 2 burner hob and a miniscule oven in our van it certainly results in some creativity. Our Omnia oven has proved invaluable when it has come to baking in the van. It gives you the freedom to cook and bake the majority of things you can in a conventional oven but on a hob!

We would like to share with you our own Van Bake off creation. This was our cake week bake, it was fairly easy to make in the van with the Omnia. This cake kept well in an airtight container,

we enjoyed some with a cup of tea and the next day with some custard - delicious!

The toffee apple topping makes it an ideal choice for Halloween.

TOFFEE APPLE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE BY VAN LIFE EATS

Ingredients

For the cake

1 cup Salted Butter

1 $\frac{1}{4}$ cups Golden caster sugar

1 3/4 cups Self- raising flour

½ tsp Bicarbonate of soda

4 Eggs

4 tbsp Milk

½ tsp Vanilla Extract

For the toffee apples

1 cup Caster Sugar

3 tbsp Water

3 Apples peeled, cored and sliced



Method

1. Start with the topping. Peel and slice the apples. Place the water and sugar in a pan, begin with a low heat until it begins to bubble and then turn the heat up until it turns amber. Make sure not to stir it, as tempting as it is!

2. Put the silicone mold in the Omnia and carefully pour the sauce into it. Very carefully place the sliced apples in the sauce.

3. For the cake, beat the butter and sugar together until pale and fluffy. Sift the flour with the bicarbonate of soda.

4. Add 2 tbsp of the flour mixture to the butter mixture along with 1 of the eggs.

5. Repeat this process until the flour and eggs are gone.

6. Stir in the milk and vanilla.

1. Pour the mixture into the Omnia and smooth with a metal spoon.

8. Bake over a medium flame for 50-55 mins.

9. Turn out when baked being careful of any hot caramel. Leave to cool.

This can also be created in a regular cake tin and oven. If using a standard cake tin you may need to use an extra apple to ensure enough topping.



Humanity is amazing sometimes, I could never have expected the help from the port workers, who not only tried to get me going, but offered me tea and their facilities whilst I was waiting, and now from the RAC guy, who stayed with me, got the van started so I could get into town to park up for the night.

DAY 2

Dover town where I was parked to. I now had to wait all day for the part to turn up, not only that, the belt was also a part that needed ordering and nobody had one in town. I was parked near a Travel Lodge and decided to pop in and ask if I could use their loos to freshen up, clean my teeth and change clothes.



The lady behind the counter did a wry look around and handed me a room key, "go and get yourself a shower my love". Yet again I feel humbled by the kindness of strangers.

A bit of back story, I was due to stay with a chap who I was going to be doing some volunteer work for in France in exchange for food and lodgings. I called him up, I informed him of my predicament and by somemiracle, he started making calls around Dover from his home in France and he found a belt in an obscure motor factors in Dover, wait, what!!!!! Later that day Tim turns up and fits my new alternator and says he will follow my journey on my YouTube channel with interest, cheers Tim for everything.

So, day 2 and my journey could start again, back to the port and on to the ferry. My new start had really begun.

I chose the VWT4 for its reliability, and cheap available parts throughout Europe. I was now heading south. First stop Le Havre for an overnight. A beautiful town was laid out before me and my decision to just go away was affirmed right in that moment.

Over the next few days, I steadily headed south east. Staying in Municipal camp sites ranging in price from 0€ to 12€ a night, all were really well equipped and welcoming to this old Brit who was starting to relax for the first time in many years. I highly recommend Municipal camp sites throughout France and also the Aires on all motorways, they are well equipped and safe.

my first job was for an old age pensioner who needed help with some gardening, and some trips to the dump and garden clearances. I stayed with him for three days and helped him do loads of jobs. During one of these jobs I met and English couple, Tony who was a builder who had moved to France to live and work and Justine his wife who pretty much spoke French, and they lived in a Hamlet called Entrebrault near Civray in central France. They said that if I wanted work, they could offer me some paid work and I was welcome anytime. A week later I was sitting with Tony and drinking in his home made bar and I ended up staying for 6 weeks. These were two of the kindest people I've met along my way and are now lifelong friends.








My name is Gracie and my partner Dylan and I have a bus we've converted ourselves that we now travel Australia in full time!


